WINGS COMMITTEES:

OUTREACH

The Outreach Committee is responsible for establishing relationships with grantees. Outreach members are assigned to all grantees as liaisons to those organizations. Members arrange meetings with grantees to establish a relationship, to discuss how the project is progressing, and to encourage submission of interim and final reports in a timely manner. outreach@wings-mn.org

GRANTS

The Grants Committee is responsible for developing, publishing and maintaining a Grants Policy, subject to approval by the Board of Directors and the Voting Membership. The Grants Committee meets 2-3 times in March-April to review the grant proposals and to make a recommendation to the Board of Directors on which grants to fund and how much to award. grants@wings-mn.org

2017 Grant Recipients \$77,106 Awarded

- Northfield Booster Club: Athletic Waiver Fees \$2,000 Help cover the costs of fee waivers for high school athletic activities; helping those who cannot afford the fee to be able to participate.
- Northfield High School Special Education: Community Real Life Experience \$150 Provide real life experiences in our Northfield community using money to pay for recreation activities and food at local businesses.
- Rice County Habitat for Humanity: Building Homes, Building Hope \$9,000 Fund a Family Service Coordinator who will help with financial literacy and financial readiness for those interested in applying for a Habitat house.
- Northfield Public Schools Community Services Hand in Hand Preschool: Creating an Engaging Learning Environment in Early Childhood \$500 Help fund the purchasing of classroom materials.
- Community Action Center: Housing Assistance \$5,000
 Provide direct rental or utility assistance to low-income households headed by women at risk of homelessness.
- IRIS Bereavement Support Packets \$1,000 Provide books, brochures, and other printed materials for 150 Bereavement Support Packets distributed in Northfield.
- Ruth's House of Hope, Inc.: Transitional Shelter Program \$3,000 - Defray the costs of providing utilities at the shelter including heat and electricity.
- Northfield Youth Sports Collaborative: Scholarship Fund \$4,500 Provide scholarships to local youth from low-income families to reduce the registration fee for participating in local sports associations.
- Project Friendship: Northfield Mentoring Activity Collaboration \$1,600 Develop and implement regular group programming for mentors and mentees throughout the 2017-2018 year.
- Northfield Public Schools TORCH Program: Student and Alumni Support \$5,000 Address the literacy gaps in our community which prevent low-income, first generation, and minority students from thriving in college and successfully obtaining living-wage jobs.
- Dakota Prairie Adult Basic Education: Family School Transportation \$1,800 Pay for transportation-bus service for participants in Northfield Family School.

- Northfield Public Schools TORCH Program: Check & Connect \$4,000 Provide mentoring focused on increasing student engagement in school and improving student outcomes.
- Northfield Public Schools: Camp FRIENDS \$2,000
 Provide social, recreational and educational programming for middle and high school students with disabilities.
- Northfield Union of Youth: Unlocking the Key \$9,311 Provide additional and intentional caring adult support to Northfield's least connected and disenfranchised youth.
- HOPE Center: Core Service Provision \$3,200 Help Northfield clients with basic needs such as gas and grocery cards as well as five nights of safehousing.
- Healthy Community Initiative: Greenvale Park Community School Sustainability Project \$8,000 - Sustain the Greenvale Park Community School Program.
- Girl Scouts ConnectZ: Northfield \$500 Deliver the ConnectZ program to underserved girls in the Northfield area.
- Dollars and \$ense: Youth IDA Program \$3,000 Hire a coordinator for the Individual Development Account program which allows low-income persons to start a savings account to support higher education expenses.
- Northfield Arts Guild: Art Out and About \$1,445 Engage youth pre-K through middle school and their families through art utilizing the Roving Art Cart and the Arts Passport Packet.
- Northfield Public Schools: Peer Helper Program \$8,000 Provide training by the Hazelden Peer Helper program to teachers and peer helpers at the high school.
- Northfield Area Family YMCA: Y Scholarships for Low-Income Families \$1,600 - Provide financial scholarships to low-income families.
- Healthfinders: Community Care Coordination \$2,500 - Improve disease management and prevention among Rice County's underserved populations, reduce fragmentation across health care systems, and broaden HFC's existing model.

It started with an invitation to Early Childhood Family Education classes. What a boon! I learned parenting skills. The children and I attended classes at the Northfield Arts Guild and performed in a few plays. We got involved in the Defeat of Jesse James Days events. We encountered people involved with Community Action Center, The Key, Northfield Historical Society, and countless other local organizations.

RICE COUNTY DOLLARS AND \$ENSE





Thanks to support from WINGS, the Rice County Dollars and \$ense program continues to assist low-income students to open Individual Development Account (IDAs). These accounts allow students from economically disadvantaged families to multiply their college savings. Students who wish to open an account must also enroll in a financial literacy class, and they receive on-going support from the Northfield TORCH program while they are in college. Student savers are allowed to save up to \$960; every dollar of savings is matched with an additional three dollars from the state of Minnesota. This means a student could have access to up to \$3,840 to help pay for college.

To date, Rice County has enrolled 65 student savers in this program, with the potential of nearly \$250,000 in additional aid. These students are enrolled in colleges across the country, including: St. Olaf College, St. John's University, College of St. Benedict, College of St. Scholastica, University of Minnesota, St. Edward's College, University of Puget Sound, Augsburg University, Gustavus Adolphus College, Winona State University, Mankato State University, Simpson College, University of St. Thomas, and Macalester College, just to name a few.

Although many of these students receive competitive need-based financial aid from their institutions, there generally is a gap between how much their aid will cover and what their families are required to pay each year. These accounts have helped close that final gap and have made college financially feasible for the student savers enrolled in this program. Of the 65 students who have opened accounts, eight have already earned their desired degree and 51 are currently enrolled in college and working toward their degree.

As of January 1, 2018, there are about 22 students who are starting the application process to the program. Due to the rules of the program, students have a very specific window in which they can enroll (January-February of their senior year). Usually, about 15 students complete the application each year and about 25 begin to access funds.
