FEATURED GRANT RECIPIENT OPERATION JOY

The holiday season can be especially difficult for low-income families. Even though their budgets are tight, parents want to give their children presents, gifts that let each child know how much he or she matters.

For more than 50 years the Community Action Center (CAC) and its partners have ensured that every Northfield family has gifts to share. This year on December 7th, Operation Joy reached around 400 families, with almost 1,000 children.

At this year's Operation Joy each family received a hand-made quilt and hand-made pajamas for every child. Families also received wrapping paper, a children's book of their choice, gas and/or grocery cards, and a \$40 gift card from Target for each child. The gift card ensures that parents can buy presents that they know their children will love.

Operation Joy depends on the generosity of volunteers. All year long more than 30 community groups sew pajamas and stitch quilts, donating thousands of hours of their time. On the day of the event more than 50 volunteers, half of whom speak Spanish, guided participating families through the process of selecting pajamas, quilts, and books. Six musical groups played throughout the day.

Operation Joy also depends on financial support from the community. This year's Operation Joy cost more than \$50,000, an amount that CAC could never afford on its own. But thanks to 33 sponsoring organizations and gifts from 300+ households, Operation Joy was a success.

WINGS is Operation Joy's single largest institutional supporter. Thanks to WINGS' generosity, hundreds of Northfield parents will be able to lift their children's spirits on what might otherwise be some of the darkest evenings of the year.
